<u>JESUS CLOSET UPDATE:</u> Due to the Coronavirus Pandemic, the shelter's we work with in Lake, Porter and LaPorte Counties are no longer accepting donations of clothing, bedding, blankets and other household items. Please do not bring any items to church as they pose a health risk for our workers and staff, and we do not have any proper areas to store these items. NWI MASKS MINISTRY: Our Cathedral's Cultural Center has become one of the largest areas for collecting and distributing materials for face masks for healthcare workers in Northwest Indiana. SAINTS OF THE DAY – BASIL THE HIEROMARTYR & GLAPHYRA THE RIGHTEOUS: Among of the Christians of Amasia was a young girl name Glaphyra. She was abducted and sold into the slavery of the royal court. She became a servant to Empress Constantina, sister of the Emperor Constantine, and wife of Licinius, an idol worshipper who persecuted Christians. Licinius became zealously enamored with Glaphyra, to the point where Constantina gave her money and helped her escape back to Amasia and the protection of Bishop Basil. She built a new cathedral there with the money she was given and wrote letters to Constantina. One of these was intercepted by a eunuch, and Licinius sent men to capture Glaphyra and Basil. Glaphyra died before she could be taken, and Basil was tortured and imprisoned for harboring a runaway slave and being an enemy of the idol worshippers. He was tried, beheaded and his body was thrown into the sea. His relics were retrieved by his priests and buried in the new cathedral in Amasia. Constantina had Licinius sent into exile for the rest of his days.

<u>DOUBTING THOMAS:</u> How easy it was for even Christ's disciples to doubt, unless some "proof" was available by sight, touch or other means. The New Testament tells us of Thomas and his doubts about the Resurrection of Jesus.

Thomas had seen the nails driven into Christ's hands and the spear thrust into His side by the soldier. But he was filled with doubt and said, "Unless I see in His hands, the print of the nails and put my finger into the print of the nails, and put my hand into His side, I will not believe" (John 20:25).

Jesus ended all of Thomas' doubts when He told him, "Reach your finger here, and look at My hands; and reach your hand here, and put it into My side. Do not be unbelieving, but believing" (John 20:27). He also said, "Blessed are those that have not seen and yet have believed" (John 20:29).

It is a wonder that we human beings, living as we are in such a materialistic society (even during the COVID-19 Pandemic people still are putting their individual needs ahead of the masses) can learn spiritual truths in any degree without proof. What a joy it is to know that we are blessed because we believe, although no visible proof has been given to us. God gave us the capacity to believe without physical proof and because we believe, we are blessed.

<u>FOLLOWING THE RESURRECTION LITURGY</u> and every service for 40 days until the Ascension of our Lord, the priest turns to the congregation and exclaims:

"Glory to His Third-Day Resurrection!" Δοξα τη Αυτου τριημερω εγερσει!

And the congregation responds by saying:

"We worship His Third-Day Resurrection!"
Προσκυνουμεν Αυτου την τριημερον εγερσιν!

Let us all remember these life-giving words at the conclusion of the Liturgy. Let us say them with feeling and strength for the 40-day period of the Resurrection.
